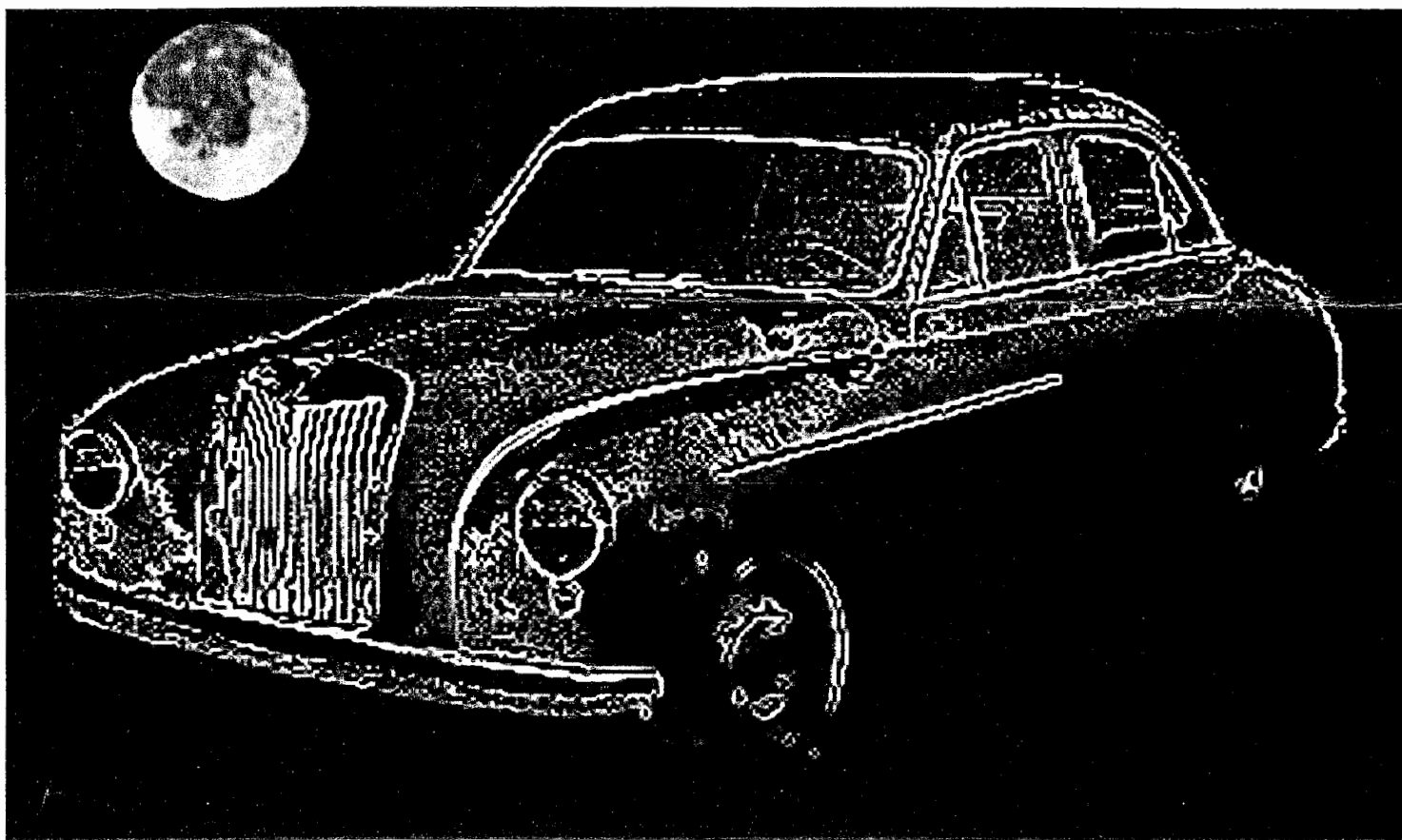

Green Lane Park

SCOTTISH IRISH FESTIVAL & HIGHLAND GAMES

Saturday, September 7th, 2002

On the shores of Deep Creek Lake in Green Lane Park

Montgomery County

Green Lane, Pennsylvania...



One of the largest Scottish Irish Festivals in Eastern Pennsylvania, and the only event of its type that is totally **free**, no admission or parking fees. The Green Lane Park Scottish Irish Festival and Highland Games began in September 2000. That one day event attracted over 10,000 visitors. The 2001 event attracted over 42,000 visitors. This year there was an evening Concert on Saturday night featuring "The Hooligans". The actual attendance this year isn't known yet, but it was huge! The rolling hills surrounding Deep Creek Lake provide the backdrop for the event. The setting is second only to Scotland and Ireland. This family event is a great way to celebrate the best of the Scottish and Irish cultures.

We were unable to get permission for a special parking area or gathering point, so... rather than cancel... this was set up as a "loose and easy" style event, where DVCers could arrive anytime, do whatever they liked, and leave when they'd had enough. A common meeting place and time was suggested for DVCers to gather, at the lake side of the large central Pavilion at 10 AM and/or at 2 PM.

The few reports received indicate this event was not well attended. However, there were an intrepid few. Larry, Carol, and Danny Kain were there, and write: "...we were at the Green Lane festival on 9/7, but did not go until the afternoon....unfortunately, we did not see any DVC'ers, I guess they were there earlier....we really enjoyed it."

Donna Bristol and Walt King were also there, and write: "The weather could not have been better on that Saturday so Donna got her TD out of the barn and washed it. Then we set off through Quakertown and route 663 and then south on route 29. Since we did not have exact directions we stopped in Red Hill and Walt asked for directions. The owner of the refreshment stand said, 'oh, yes, just go down a bit farther on route 29 and you will see a large school on your right. They have a large sign giving directions to the event. It is back by the Outdoors Camp.' So off we go, soon find the school, and a large sign indicates it is back by the camp so we turn in and no one is around so we turn around and see a lady jogging and we stop her. She told us to take the next road on the right. We do and end up at the school again and find a small blacktop road going down the hill. We follow the road and come up to a group of buildings with signs saying 'Outdoor Camp'. Finally find a young woman who says she is the director. We asked the way and she said 'wait here', went into the building and brought out a map. She said the festival signs were in the wrong place and we should go further south on route 29. It is the next road on the right. We found the correct road marked with a large sign saying 'S/I Fest'. Eventually we found the spot. It was lovely. Many people were there. Surrounding a lake (where Nessie and her baby were floating) was the Celtic Festival on one side and a 'sheepdog' herding contest on the other. The place was packed. We asked the parking attendants, traffic police, and the park rangers where was the place for MG car parking and all said they didn't know! By then it was after noon so we drove around, found a place to park behind the band stand. We saw many concessions selling all sorts of items 'Celtic' and one bagpipe band demonstrating and playing well. No other bands. We searched on foot for DVC club members but no luck. Where were youse guys?" (The "exact directions" were detailed in the event flyer, July issue of T-Talk...which also explained that there was no special MG parking place, and suggested a meeting place for DVCers....ed)
